



Solar Mamas

The **Solar Mamas** initiative is an empowering global program that completely redefines rural electrification and gender roles. Here is a comprehensive overview of how it works and where you can find more information. [1, 2]

How the program works

The concept is coordinated primarily by the [Barefoot College International](#). It is built upon a highly intentional and unique framework: [3]

- **Target group:** The program deliberately selects mature women—frequently **grandmothers or mothers aged 35 to 50**—who are semi-literate or completely illiterate. They must be deeply rooted in their villages so that they are highly likely to return and use their knowledge locally. [4, 5, 6]
- **Overcoming language barriers:** Because these women travel to training hubs from different parts of the world, they usually do not share a common language. They learn sophisticated electrical engineering entirely through **visual charts, color-coded components, signs, and hands-on practice** ("learning by doing"). [5]
- **The timeline:** Over an intensive **6-month training period**, the women learn how to build, install, repair, and maintain solar home lighting systems, controllers, and lanterns. [3, 5]
- **Community impact:** When they return home, they electrify their villages. This eliminates the need for expensive and toxic kerosene lamps, allows children to study after dark, and enables small businesses to expand their hours. [1, 2, 7]
